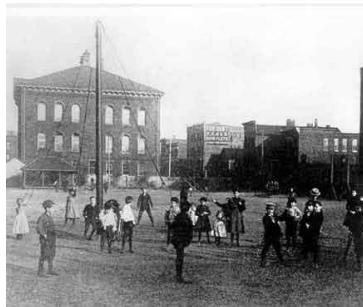

The Hull House Museum



Jane Addams was once the country's most prominent woman: a writer, settlement founder, and prominent international peace activist. She co-founded the Hull-House social settlement in 1889. Social settlements served as an innovative solution to the problems of urbanization, industrialization, and immigration. They brought educated, native born, middle-class and upper-middle class “residents” to live (settle) in poor urban neighborhoods and create thriving communities. At the time, Chicago’s Near West Side was a densely populated urban neighborhood with Italian, Irish, German, Greek, Bohemian, and Russian and Polish Jewish immigrants. During the 1920s, African Americans and Mexicans also began to put down roots in the neighborhood. The Settlement helped launch the Immigrants' Protective League, the first juvenile court in the nation, and a Juvenile Psychopathic Clinic. They also innovated and championed legislation protecting women and children at the state and federal level. Come learn about this history and more firsthand!
